PART 1: Introduction and Interview (8 marks)

Sample Strong Response:

Q: *What are you currently studying?*

Strong Answer: "I'm currently in my second year of the HSSC-A program at Ziauddin University, where I'm studying Computer Science. I chose this field because I've always been fascinated by how technology shapes our daily lives, and I want to contribute to developing innovative solutions that can help people. My favorite subject is programming because it allows me to transform creative ideas into functional applications."

Q: *Can you describe your hometown?*

Strong Answer: "I'm from Karachi, which is Pakistan's largest city and commercial hub. It's a vibrant, diverse metropolis with a population of over 20 million people. What I love most about Karachi is its cultural diversity—you can find people from all regions of Pakistan here, which creates a rich tapestry of traditions, cuisines, and languages. The city has beautiful beaches along the Arabian Sea, and there's always something happening, whether it's cultural festivals or educational events."

Evaluation Points: Look for extended responses (2-3 sentences minimum), relevant details, appropriate vocabulary, grammatical accuracy, and natural delivery.

Sample Strong Response (Topic Card A - Influential Person):

"I'd like to talk about my English teacher, Ms. Sarah Ahmed, who has profoundly influenced my academic journey and personal development. I first met Ms. Ahmed when I entered 11th grade at my school, and she has been my mentor for the past two years.

What makes Ms. Ahmed exceptional is her genuine passion for teaching and her unwavering belief in her students' potential. She possesses remarkable patience and always takes time to explain difficult concepts in multiple ways until every student understands. Beyond her subject expertise, she demonstrates exceptional emotional intelligence, recognizing when students are struggling and offering support that extends beyond academics.

Ms. Ahmed's influence on my life has been transformative in several ways. First, she helped me develop confidence in my communication skills. I used to be extremely shy and hesitant to speak in class, but through her encouragement and constructive feedback, I gradually learned to express my ideas clearly and confidently. She would often say, 'Your voice matters, and your perspective brings value to our discussions,' which really resonated with me.

Second, she taught me the importance of critical thinking. Rather than simply accepting information, she encouraged us to question, analyze, and form our own informed opinions. This approach has changed how I approach not just my studies but life in general. She would often challenge us with thought-provoking questions and create debates where we had to defend different perspectives, which really sharpened my analytical skills.

Finally, Ms. Ahmed influenced my career aspirations. Through her example, I've seen how educators can genuinely impact lives, and this has inspired me to consider education as a possible career path. She showed me that teaching isn't just about transferring knowledge—it's about nurturing potential, building confidence, and preparing young people to navigate the world.

Her influence continues to shape my approach to challenges and my interactions with others, and I'm grateful to have had such a remarkable mentor during these formative years."

Sample Strong Responses:

Q: How has education changed in your country over the past few decades?

Strong Answer: "Education in Pakistan has undergone significant transformation over the past few decades, particularly in terms of accessibility and methodology. One major change has been the expansion of access to education, especially for girls and in rural areas, though challenges certainly remain. There's been a gradual shift from purely rote memorization toward more conceptual understanding and critical thinking, though this transition is still ongoing and varies considerably between institutions. Technology has also become increasingly integrated into education, with many schools and universities now using digital resources, online learning platforms, and multimedia teaching tools. However, there's still a considerable gap between urban and rural educational facilities, and addressing this disparity remains one of Pakistan's major educational challenges."

Q: Will online education replace traditional classrooms?

Strong Answer: "I don't believe online education will completely replace traditional classrooms, but I think we're moving toward a hybrid model that combines the best of both approaches. Traditional classrooms offer irreplaceable benefits—face-to-face interaction, immediate feedback, social development, and hands-on learning experiences that are difficult to replicate online. However, online education provides flexibility, personalized pacing, and access to global resources that traditional classrooms cannot always offer. The pandemic demonstrated both the potential and limitations of remote learning. I think the future lies in blended learning, where physical classrooms are enhanced by digital tools and online resources, rather than one completely replacing the other. Different subjects and age groups will likely require different balances between these approaches."

Evaluation Points: Look for abstract thinking, well-developed opinions with justification, ability to discuss broader implications, balanced viewpoints, and sophisticated language use.

GENERAL ASSESSMENT GUIDELINES

- 1. Pronunciation and Intelligibility:** While accent is not assessed, speech must be intelligible. Minor pronunciation errors that don't impede understanding should not be penalized heavily.
- 2. Self-correction:** Candidates who self-correct demonstrate language awareness and should not be penalized.
- 3. Hesitation:** Natural hesitation for thought is acceptable; problematic hesitation is when it significantly disrupts communication.
- 4. Length:** Part 2 should be approximately 2 minutes. If significantly shorter (under 1 minute), deduct marks for task achievement.
- 5. Interactive Communication:** In Part 3, candidates should demonstrate ability to develop ideas, not just provide brief answers.
- 6. Consistency:** Apply marking criteria consistently across all candidates.
